Disabled Veterans eligible for free National Park Service Lifetime Access Pass

Good for entry into 400+ National Parks and over 2,000 recreation sites across the country

Spring flowers are blooming, the summer travel season quickly approaches and Veterans are joining the 330-million yearly visitors enjoying U.S. National Parks.

Many Veterans, with a service connected disability rating, are entering Federal parks for free with the <u>Lifetime National Parks Access Pass</u> from the U.S. Department of the Interior, National Park Service. Good for entry into 400+ National Parks and over 2,000 recreation sites across the country, the Lifetime Access Pass is another way a grateful nation says thank you for the service and sacrifices of Veterans with disabilities.

The Access Pass admits disabled Veterans and any passengers in their vehicle (non-commercial) at pervehicle fee areas; and, the pass owner plus three additional adults where per-person fees are charged. In addition to free entry at participating parks, the Access Pass includes discounts on expanded amenity fees; such as camping, swimming, boat launching and guided tours.

Veterans who have a VA disability rating, (10 percent or higher) are eligible for the Lifetime Access Pass—with two ways to apply.

First, disabled Veterans can apply in person at a participating federal recreation site. Simply present photo identification (Driver's license, State ID, Passport) and documentation proving a permanent disability (VA awards letter, VA ID with service connected annotation, VA summary of benefits, or receipt of Social Security disability income). That's It. The Pass is free and issued at the time of entry.

Second, if applying by mail, send a completed packet and \$10 processing fee to the United States Geological Survey (USGS). The packet should include:

- The Access Pass application form
- Proof of residency
- VA disability award letter, VA summary of benefits, or proof of SSDI income

Editor's Note: We will have the lists of Pennsylvania and New Jersey Federal Recreation Sites at the Post as well as Access Pass Applications if interested in applying by mail.

Pass delivery expected 10-12 weeks after receipt.

Make sure to have photo ID available when using your Lifetime Access Pass and enjoy the majestic scenery and abundant recreational opportunities our National Parks provide.

National Guard members speak on PA GI Bill after it passes in State House vote

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. – A bill that Gov. Tom Wolf introduced earlier this year to help support National Guard families' members passed in the House earlier this month.

The bill offers additional benefits to soldiers and their families. Officials say it will help keep more soldiers who have experience on board -- as the requests for them increase.

Pennsylvania could be the first state to support National Guard members' families after the House passed the bill by a unanimous vote.

As we see more severe weather, the demand for the National Guard increases and with the increase in service, officials say more benefits should be offered.

"We've been asking more and more of our guardsmen, to make more sacrifices, more time away from their families, more time away from their civilian jobs," Adjutant General of Pennsylvania Maj. Gen. Tony Carrelli said. "We've been used more and more for snowstorms, for flooding, for hurricanes."

In February, Wolf introduced the PA National Guard Military Family Education Program, which would provide benefits to National Guard service members' families.

"It is a nice opportunity for a benefit that I've earned to be able to give it to my children or pass it to a child," Staff Sgt. Mark Milanovich said.

With this bill, if a service member reenlists for service, they can transfer their program benefits to a spouse or a child. The benefit provides assistance for up to 10 semesters or five years, equivalent to the instate rate of the Pennsylvania state system of higher education.

"The bill is a great retention tool to help keep soldiers in that are looking to better themselves as a solider and give families the credit that they deserve," Sgt. Keegan Beaver said.

Milanovich is an active member in the National Guard,; he said it's more than just them making a sacrifice -- their families do, too.

"Our kids sacrifice time with mom or dad, especially with a yearlong deployment," Milanovich said. In a statement, Wolf said, "We all share a commitment to supporting our Pennsylvania national guard members and their families. The unsung heroes who hold down the fort." "Our families serve and sacrifice

right along, (with us); they don't wear a uniform but they have to put up with a lot," Carrelli said.

Next, the Senate has to vote on the bill. There's no word yet on how long that will take. Editor's Note: This story refers to PA House Bill 1324. Since this story was first reported on May 28, the Senate took up the measure and passed it. As of press time, it is awaiting the Governor's signature. This is a great piece of legislation for our National Guardsmen and their families.

Wall of Faces – Missing Photos

Terry S. Small: The twenty-year-old private first class was a laboratory technician at Metropolitan Hospital before he joined the Marine Corps in February 1969. Small was sent to Vietnam and assigned to Company G of the 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines, 1st Marine Division. He was killed on Sept. 4, 1969 six weeks after arriving in the war zone, in Quang Nam Province, when a grenade from friendly forces exploded near him. Survivors included his mother and stepfather.

Joseph Stojinski, Jr: Stojinski served three tours of duty in Vietnam before dying there on October 20, 1970. The 26-year-old Army specialist five had a variety of military specialties and was working as a company clerk with Company D of the 55th Engineer Battalion at the time of his death. He was survived by a wife and a son.

As we celebrate our nation's independence from Great Britain here are some interesting facts on the Revolutionary War:

- There were 2,165,076 British colonists living in North America during the war. Twenty percent remained loyal to the Crown.
- The British had 133,000 troops. Of these, 56,000 were regular military soldiers. 30,000 German (Hessian) troops joined the fight. 13,000 Native Americans fought for the Redcoats along with 19,000 loyal colonists. 24,000 British troops died.
- 96,000 troops served in the American Army. Only 35,000 of those were regular Army. 45,000 were militiamen citizen soldiers. 5,000 sailors served along with 12,000 French troops. 25,000 American soldiers died; only 4,435 died in battle. About 10,000 troops died of disease. 18,000 troops were taken as prisoners of war and 10,000 of these soldiers died of disease, mistreatment and hunger. American troops were three times more likely to dies on a British prison ship than in battle!
- About 25,000 freed blacks and slaves served on both sides.

Why Are They Called "Dog Days" of Summer?

We often hear about the "dog days" of summer but few know what the expression means. Some say that it signifies hot sultry days "not fit for a dog;" others suggest it's the weather in which dogs go mad. The Dog Days of Summer describes the most oppressive period of summer, between July 3rd and August 11th each year. But where did the term come from? And what does it have to do with dogs?

The phrase is actually a reference to the fact that, during this time, the Sun occupies the same region of the sky as Sirius, the brightest star visible from any part of Earth and part of the constellation Canis Major, the Greater Dog. This is why Sirius is sometimes called the Dog Star. In the summer, Sirius rises and sets with the Sun. On July 23rd, specifically, it is in conjunction with the Sun, and because the star is so bright, the ancient Romans believed it actually gave off heat and added to the Sun's warmth, accounting for the long stretch of sultry weather. They referred to this time as *diēs caniculārēs*, or "dog days."

Thus, the term Dog Days of Summer came to mean the 20 days before and 20 days after this alignment of Sirius with the Sun—July 3 to Aug. 11. While this period usually *is* the hottest stretch of summer, the heat is not due to any added radiation from Sirius, regardless of its brightness. The heat of summer is simply a direct result of the Earth's tilt. During summer in the Northern Hemisphere, the tilt of the Earth causes the Sun's rays to hit at a more direct angle, and for a longer period of time throughout the day. This means longer, hotter days.
