VA to open clinic in the Northeast

The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs is in the process of setting up a community healthcare clinic in Northeast Philadelphia.

Veterans who live in Northeast Philadelphia may soon have a healthcare option closer to home. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs has begun the process of establishing its first location in the Northeast. A spokesman for the Corporal Michael J. Crescenz VA Medical Center told the *Northeast Times* that officials in Washington recently approved the new clinic.

"We're excited," Philadelphia VA spokesman Jonathan Hodges said. "It's a long time coming from what I'm told."

Officials have not yet decided on a location for the community-based outpatient clinic, Hodges said. He said the center will be a primary care facility that also provides specialty care referrals to the main hospital in University City. Currently, the VA's closest community clinic is in Horsham. The agency also operates the "Northeast Philadelphia Vet Center," which, oddly enough, is in Olney. Another Vet Center is located in Bristol.

"We have always recognized the need for a VA location in the Northeast especially as we work to ensure we can give veterans care not only when they want it but where they want it," Hodges said in an email. Hodges said he expects the VA will narrow down a list of potential locations for the new clinic in the spring or early summer. The Philadelphia office is also considering partnering with the University of Pennsylvania on the project, he said.

Remembering Operation Iraqi Freedom and the Iraq War: March 2003

In the aftermath of 9/11, President George W. Bush claimed that Iraqi government led by Saddam Hussein was providing material support to Al-Qaeda and was continuing its production of weapons of mass destruction (WMD) in violation of numerous United Nations Security Council resolutions. As such, the administration made the disarmament of Iraq a top foreign policy initiative. In November 2002, the UN passed a resolution requiring Iraq to readmit arms inspectors and to comply fully with all previous UN resolutions. By 2003, the US and their British allies along with 22 other allied nations were convinced that the Iraqis were still thwarting the arms inspectors. Despite French and German insistence to allow more time for sanctions and diplomacy to work, President Bush gave Hussein 48 hours for him and his sons to leave Iraq.


When that deadline passed, on March 20, 2003, Bush ordered an attack on Iraq with the intention of ousting Saddam Hussein regime. The invasion was code named "Operation Iraqi Freedom." US forces faced relatively light resistance in the south predominantly from paramilitary and irregular fighters. By April 4th, US troops took control of the Baghdad airport and by April 9th, the same day British forces took Al Basra, US soldiers took control

of Baghdad. From the north, US Special Forces, along with Kurdish 'peshmerga' allies seized Kirkuk on April 10th and Mosul on April 11th. Saddam's hometown of Tikrit fell on April 13th. On May 1st, President Bush declared an end to major combat operations.

Restoring law and order to the country became a much harder mission to accomplish than ousting the Ba'th Party regime. A large-scale insurgency engulfed the country – mostly along sectarian lines bringing the country to the brink of civil war.

While the first phase of combat posted 150 US fatalities, the death toll rose to 1,000 by November 2004 and over 3,000 by early 2007. In January 2007, President Bush announced a controversial plan to add 20,000 troops to the fight in what became known as "the surge." Although US Forces took heavy casualties, the plan worked and resistance ebbed. In February 2009, newly-elected President Barak Obama announced combat forces would be withdrawn by August 2010 and the remaining troops would pull out by the end of 2011. According to the Department of Defense, there were a total of 4,424 soldiers killed and 31,952 were wounded in action.





Chaplain's Corner By: Bob Cummings

During this time of turmoil, I think it's worthwhile to reflect on the words of President Ronald Reagan as he focused his weekly radio address on the observance of the Easter and Passover holidays in April 1983. The following is excerpted from that address.

"This week, as American families draw together in worship, we join with millions upon millions of others around the world also celebrating the traditions of their faiths. During these days, at least, regardless of nationality, religion, or race, we are united by faith in God, and the barriers between us seem less significant."

"Observing the rites of Passover and Easter, we're linked in time to the ancient origins of our values and to the unborn generations who will still celebrate them long after we're gone. As Paul explained in his Epistle to the Ephesians, 'He came and preached peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near. So then you were no longer strangers and aliens, but you were fellow citizens of God's household.""

"This is a time of hope and peace, when our spirits are filled and lifted. It's a time when we give thanks for our blessings - chief among them, freedom, peace, and the promise of eternal life."

"This week Jewish families and friends have been celebrating Passover, a tradition rich in symbolism and meaning. Its observance reminds all of us that the struggle for freedom and the battle against oppression waged by Jews since ancient times is one shared by people everywhere. And Christians have been commemorating the last momentous days leading to the crucifixion of Jesus 1,950 years ago." "Tomorrow, as morning spreads around the planet, we'll celebrate the triumph of life over death, the Resurrection of Jesus. Both observances tell of sacrifice and pain but also of hope and triumph."

"In this Easter season when so many of our young men and women in the Armed Forces are stationed so very far from their homes, I can't resist recounting at least one example of their sacrifice and heroism. Every day I receive reports that would make you very proud, and today I'd like to share just one with you."

"While the San Diego-based U.S.S. Hoel was steaming toward Melbourne, Australia, on Ash Wednesday, its crew heard of terrible brush fires sweeping two Australian States. More than 70 people were killed and the destruction was great. Well, the crew of this American ship raised \$4,000 from their pockets to help, but they felt that it wasn't enough. So, leaving only a skeleton crew aboard, the 100 American sailors gave up a day's shore leave, rolled up their sleeves, and set to work rebuilding a ruined community on the opposite end of the Earth. Just Americans being Americans, but something for all of us to be proud of."

"Stories like these -- of men and women around the world who love God and freedom -- bear a message of world hope and brotherhood like the rites of Passover and Easter that we celebrate this weekend."

Vestie T. Driggers: Driggers played trumpet in a professional band for several years before entering the Army in November 1967. The specialist 4, a light weapons infantryman, was assigned to Company B of the 2nd Battalion 502nd Infantry, 101st Airborne Division. He died in Vietnam on November 29, 1968 at age 24.

Willie Durant: North Wilton St., West Phila., Durant left West Philly High in January 1967 for a career in the Army. The 18 year old PFC, an assistant machine gunner with Company A of the 3rd Battalion, 60th Infantry, 9th Infantry Division, died in Vietnam on Jan 17, 1968. He was survived by his parents, five sisters and three brothers.
