In March, there were 11 men from Pennsylvania whose pictures had not been found. We are happy to report that pictures of three of those men, William Corey (Williamsport), John Hargrave (Glenside) and Jimmie McMorris (Norristown) have been found! Eight men, all from Philadelphia, remain. If you served with any of these heroes or know them from the neighborhood and have a photo let us know and we'll help put you in touch with the VVMF. You can also help by spreading the word to your friends, family and coworkers. Let's help honor these men and make sure they are not forgotten to history!

Wall of Faces – Missing Photos

Matthew Harris, Jr. The career of Air Force non-commissioned officer, a 1948 graduate of Overbrook High School had served in Japan and Morocco, among other places before being assigned to the 33rd Air Force Dispensary in Vietnam in February 1965. The 34-year-old medical service technician died in Saigon on May 28, 1965. He was survived by a wife and a son.

Eugene Martin: Zeralda Street, Germantown. The career Navy man drowned in Vietnam on December 12, 1965 at the age of 40, while directing a crew running an oil line from an offshore tanker to Chu Lai Beach in Quang Nam Province. The boatswain's mate Third Class was assigned to the West Pacific Detachment, Amphibious Construction Brigade, and was due to retire in three weeks. Martin had fought in World War II and Korea. The bachelor was planning to return home to Philadelphia, where he was survived by two brothers and a sister.

UNATTENDED VETERAN AT WASHINGTON'S CROSSING VETERAN CEMETERY

On the last Thursday of each month (May 30 and June 27) at 2PM, Washington's Crossing National Cemetery, in Newtown, Bucks County, a ceremony for all veterans who have died during the month but had no one attending their burial. The ceremony includes full Military Honors and a folded flag is presented to a volunteer on behalf of those who died. Everyone deserves to have someone at the end; to have their name spoken and their lives and service honored and memorialized. The cemetery is located at 830 Highland Rd., Newtown, PA. Flag Trivia Answers

June 14, 1777 the Continental Congress adopts a resolution stating that "the flag of the United States be thirteen alternate stripes red and white" and that "the Union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new Constellation

Robert Heft (1942-2009), then 16t designed the fifty-star flag. Stanley Pratt, Heft's teacher at Lancaster High School, asked his students to design a flag for the admittance of Hawaii and Alaska as states in the United States. Heft chose to arrange the fifty white stars on a blue background. Five rows had six stars, and four rows had five stars. It took Heft 12.5 hours to sew the flag together. Heft was given a B- as the grade for the flag. Heft sent his flag to his Congressman Walter Moeller, who succeeded in having Heft's design adopted as the new United States flag on July 4, 1960.

After the addition of the states of Vermont and Kentucky in the United States in 1795, two more stripes (& two more stars) were added to the flag totaling the number to 15. In 1818, as five more states were about to enter the union, it was decided to revert back to the 13 stripes symbolizing the original 13 colonies. There are six flags on the moon, one from each Apollo mission from 1969 to 1972. The first, planted by Neal Armstrong was knocked over by the rocket blast when departing the moon. Images taken by NASA's Lunar Reconnaissance Orbiter in 2012 do show that at five out six flags still stand. However, scientists think decades' worth of brilliant sunlight have bleached out their emblematic colors.

False. Only the President, state Governor, or the Mayor of Washington D.C. can order flags be flown at half-staff.

False. The Flag Code is simply a guideline for proper flag etiquette. The law does not provide penalties for violation of any of its provisions.

William Driver, a sea captain from Salem Massachusetts received the 17' x 10' homemade flag with 24 stars in 1824, sewn for him by his mother and a group of young Salem female admirers to celebrate his appointment, at the age of just 21, as a master mariner and commander of his own ship, the *Charles Doggett*. According to legend, when Driver raised the flag up the main mast, he lifted his hat and declaimed, "My ship, my country, and my flag, Old Glory."

It was first flown over the shores of Tripoli. The Marines were involved in military actions against the Barbary pirates in the Battle of Derne in 1805 and after they hit the shore, they raised the Stars and Stripes. It was the first time the US Flag was flown on foreign soil.

Francis Scott Key wrote the Star Spangled Banner as a poem on Sept 14, 1814. It was the War of 1812.

Throughout the 19th century, "The Star-Spangled Banner" was regarded as the national anthem by most branches of the U.S. armed forces and other groups, but it was not until 1916, and the signing of an executive order by President Woodrow Wilson, that it was formally designated as such. In March 1931, Congress passed an act confirming Wilson's presidential order, and on March 3 President Hoover signed it into law.
