Membership: A new year has begun for the American Legion and it's time to send in your 2021 dues. Our goal is that we get to 100% by December, so if you haven't paid yet, please take a couple minutes to send in a check for \$30. You can also pay safely and conveniently online with a credit or debit card by going to www.legion.org/membership/renewals. When paying online you can print out a 'temporary' card which is completely valid, but be advised your 'permanent' card from the post may be delayed due to national and state processing times.

As you may recall, last year Congress passed the LEGION Act which acknowledged that the United States has been in a state of war since December 7, 1941. This designation is important to the Legion as a way to honor approximately 1,600 American service members who were killed or wounded in previously undeclared periods of war. It is also significant in that it opens the door for approximately 6 million veterans to join the American Legion and avail themselves to the programs and benefits the Legion offers that they had not been previously eligible.

As an added incentive to sign up new members, our National Commander, James W. "Bill" Oxford will award a special "A Foundation for the Future" membership excellence pin to any Legionnaire who obtains three new members into The American Legion.

A new member is any eligible person joining for the 2021 membership year who was not a member of The American Legion during the 2020 membership year.

Each member listed must be eligible for membership in The American Legion. Only one pin will be awarded per individual. Upon receipt, national membership staff will confirm the names and mail the pin directly to the person who earned it.

That Other Virus By: James W. "Bill" Oxford National Commander

There is a virus in America that could cause more long-term destruction than COVID-19. Just as the novel coronavirus can quickly devastate a healthy body this other virus threatens lives, neighborhoods and infrastructures. No person or place is truly safe. It can embed itself inside a peaceful protest and turn it into a nightmare of violent rioting and retribution. It turns Americans against Americans. This virus is called anarchy.

Perhaps no one should be more concerned about this virus than those who justly fight for civil rights and equality. Their cause has been hijacked. George Floyd and Breonna Taylor receive only occasional mentions on the evening news while footage of statue-toppling, tear gas and batons dominates. One network's description of a live event will usually have the opposite perspective of another network. Division is a symptom of this virus and its cancer has reached a stage unseen since the Civil War. The patient is quickly approaching stage 4.

At our 1962 National Convention, American Legion delegates defined "Americanism" in such an eloquent manner that we still adhere to it. It stated that the essence of Americanism is class, religious and racial tolerance. Written as if it were a vaccine against our current anarchy virus, it further states "law and order are essential to the preservation of Americanism while lawlessness and violence are distinctly un-American."

That's worth repeating. "Lawlessness and violence are distinctly un-American." Peaceful protests against racism are just, admirable and constitutionally protected. It's ok if protests make people feel uncomfortable. A good protest is supposed to do that. But many people feel unsafe. This is what distinguishes protestors from anarchists and rioters.

Whether generated from the extreme left or the extreme right, the cracked skulls and burning buildings don't care. They are damaged, sometimes permanently.

Instead of fighting this virus like good scientists, public officials are failing us. People are being killed while local, state and federal agencies fight over jurisdiction. Add partisan politics to the growing list of symptoms.

Most police officers are brave and honorable. Some are not and those who abuse their positions should be held accountable. In the fog of a riot, it is sometimes difficult for officers to distinguish between a peaceful protestor and a violent anarchist. Again, police officers who commit crimes should be prosecuted. Same with a brick-throwing anarchist.

Federal agents are charged with enforcing federal law and protecting federal property. State and local law enforcement officers have parallel responsibilities in their respective areas. Mayors, governors and the federal government must work as one when it comes to public safety. Agencies at every level must collaborate. People are dying. The enemy is not each other. It's the violent anarchist. Unity is the cure.

100 Miles for Hope

Our National Commander, James W "Bill" Oxford, along with SAL National Commander Clint Bolt and National Auxiliary President Nicole Clapp have issued a challenge to all Legion Family members to walk, run, bike or motorcycle 100 miles between now and Veterans Day to benefit the American Legion Veterans and Children Foundation. The "100 Miles for Hope" Campaign will help raise money for the V&CF Fund while encouraging members to stay active during the pandemic. Originally announced to begin on August 3, the challenge would have represented 100 miles in 100 days. By the time you are reading this, we're somewhat behind and it would take a little over 1.5 miles/day to meet the challenge. The cost to register for the event is \$30 which includes a tee shirt and a certificate of completion. For more information go to www.legion.org/100miles.

US Space Force

On December 20, 2019, with the passage of the National Defense Authorization Act, the United States established the sixth branch the Armed Forces – the US Space Force (USSF). Space Force is now the newest armed service since the creation of the Air Force in 1947.

The Space Force was established within the Department of the Air Force and operates under the leadership of the Secretary of the Air Force. General John W. "Jay" Raymond was selected as the first Chief of Space Operations and serves as a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.



Military members of the Air Force Space Command (AFSPC) have now been reassigned to the USSF but temporarily remain in the Air Force while the Space Force formalizes its infrastructure over the next year. Eventually, the Department of Defense expects to consolidate space missions from across the Armed Forces into the USSF.

POW/MIA RECOGNITION DAY - SEPTEMBER 18, 2020

On the third Friday of September, we pause to remember the U.S. servicemembers who never came home, either living or dead. We honor our that were either prisoners of war or still missing in action.


POW/MIA Recognition Day is one of six in which Congress has mandated the flying of the POW/MIA Flag; the others days are Armed Forces Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day and Veterans Day.

According to the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency, (as of August 7, 2020) approximately 82,000 Americans who fought in those wars are still missing, including: approximately 72,583 from World War II, 7,579 from the Korean War, 1,586 from Vietnam, 126 from the Cold War and 6 from conflicts since 1991.

The DPAA said about 75 percent of those missing Americans are somewhere in the Asia-Pacific. More than 41,000 have been presumed lost at sea. Efforts to find those men, identify them and bring them home are constant. For example, so far this year, the DPAA has identified the remains of 92 servicemen.

Staff Sergeant Madison Alexander Strohlein MISSING IN ACTION, June 22, 1971 Quang Nam Province, Vietnam

Madison "Skip" Strohlein, a 1966 graduate of Cheltenham High School and student at Temple University, entered the U.S. Army and served with U.S. Army Republic of Vietnam (USARV TAG) Task Force Advisory Element TF-1AE (formerly MACV-SOG). At 3AM on a dark and stormy June 22, 1971, he and three other U.S. soldiers performed a HALO (high altitude, low opening) parachute jump from 19,000 feet behind enemy lines into Quang Nam province



(approx. 40 miles NW of Kham Duc and 5 miles east of the Laotian border) to conduct a reconnaissance mission. The men became separated during their jump and were unable to link up on the ground. Sergeant Strohlein was injured during the jump and stuck in a tree. He radioed to request a medical evacuation, but radio contact with him was lost before rescuers could reach him. When contact was lost, enemy forces were moving near his position. When a search team managed to reach the area the next day, they found SGT Strohlein's weapon and signs of a firefight, but could not locate him. He remains unaccounted for and it is believed he was taken prisoner by the Vietnamese. Following the incident, Strohlein was promoted to Staff Sergeant. According to the DOD POW/MIA Accounting Agency, his case is listed as "Active Pursuit", which means there is 'sufficient information to justify research, investigation or recovery operations in the field...(and) are the priority for operational planning and allocation of resources." Strohlein was declared presumed dead on October 24, 1974. His name appears on the Wall on Panel 3W, line 86.
