Remembering One of Our Own

SP4 Raymond J. Ahern Jr. C BTRY, 2ND BN, 19TH ARTILLERY, 1ST CAV DIV

DOB: 1/14/48 KIA: 11/26/68

Ray Ahern, of Oak Drive in Holmesburg worked



for the Amplex Manufacturing Co on Torresdale Avenue and was engaged to Kathleen Reese when he was drafted in December 1967. He was a 1965 graduate of Father Judge High School and the 23rd Father Judge alum to die in action in Vietnam.

A member of the 2nd Battalion, 1st Air Cavalry, he had been in Vietnam for six months. He died in Tay Ninh Province northeast of Saigon on Nov. 26, 1968. His parents received many phone calls and letters from men with whom he had served, and for 15 years following his death, his commanding officer sent flowers to be placed on his grave. He was survived by his parents, a brother, Robert, 18, and a sister, Mary Ann, 12.

Raymond is buried in St. Dominic's Cemetery and is memorialized on the Vietnam Veterans Wall on Panel 38W Line 63

I remember Ray as someone I just clicked with. Every now and then you meet someone like that. He had an infectious smile and a warm way about him. We were both Irish Catholic kids from the Northeast and he was very easy to talk to. It was like being with someone from my neighborhood back home and after a few weeks I felt like I had known him for years.

We first met up north when we were working the Quang Tri area. In late October 1968 our division moved down into the area northwest of Saigon that borders Cambodia. It was a very different war than what we had seen in the Quang Tri area. We were no longer near villages and civilians. We were working in triple canopy jungle along the Cambodian border. We were running into large concentrations of North Vietnamese regulars who were well armed and liked to stay and fight.

One of the worst fire bases in our early days down south was LZ Rita. It was a very bad place from the first moment we stepped off the choppers. We had taken over from the 1st Infantry Division (Big Red One) on November 9th. They had been overrun the night before we got there. We stayed on Rita for several days to rebuild the bunkers and secure the area around the LZ. The bad guys were constantly hitting us with mortars and rockets and they were constantly probing our perimeter. We then left the LZ and went out into the jungle about ten kilometers and started to sweep in a very large circle around the LZ. We conducted operations out in the bush for about ten days and were then sent back in to defend the perimeter on Rita.

Ray was killed in the middle of the night on November 26, 1968 on Landing Zone Rita. His bunker took a direct hit from a rocket and he was killed instantly. I remember having to move out the next morning and it didn't seem right. There was no time to grieve or think about Ray or what had just happened, just move out and watch out for the bad guys. He was a bright star in a very dark period in my life. He made life in Vietnam a little more bearable for me and I hope I did the same for him.

On the last Thursday of each month at 2PM, Washington's Crossing National Cemetery in Newtown, Bucks County holds a ceremony for all veterans who have died during the month but had no one attending their burial. The ceremony includes full Military Honors and a folded flag is presented to a volunteer on behalf of those who died. Everyone deserves to have someone at the end: to have their name spoken and their lives and service honored and memorialized. The cemetery is located at 830 Highland Rd., Newtown, PA

PA State Treasurer Stacy Garrity Returns 36 Military Decorations, Including WWI Medal

114 military decorations have been returned since Treasurer Garrity took office

On August 11 PA State Treasurer Stacy Garrity announced the return of 36 military decorations to three different veterans and families of veterans living in Berks, Blair, and Chester counties, including a medal and ribbon honoring service in World War I.

The 36 decorations returned included medals, pins, patches and military identification tags (dog tags), were sent to Treasury as unclaimed property as contents of abandoned safe deposit boxes. In addition to the WWI medal and ribbon, the items returned include WWII pins, a Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citation, a Saudi Arabian Medal for the Liberation of Kuwait, and a 101st Airborne Division pin and patch.

Treasury's effort to return military decorations is part of its overall work to return unclaimed property. While most unclaimed property comes in the form of money, Treasury also receives items such as jewelry, collectibles, and other family keepsakes – often from forgotten safe deposit boxes. All of the tangible items, including military decorations, are stored in Treasury's massive vault.

Most tangible items are auctioned after three years if the rightful owner doesn't come forward

(leaving the proceeds of any auction to be claimed in perpetuity). Military decorations are never auctioned.

Since Treasury started the military medal return initiative in 2018, 412 military decorations have been returned. To search the database of the 617 military decorations currently in Treasury's vault, visit https://www.patreasury.gov/unclaimed-property/medals/.

Treasury also has more than \$4 billion in unclaimed property waiting to be reunited with the rightful owners. One in ten Pennsylvanians is owed unclaimed property, and the average claim is worth \$2,000.

Treasury's unclaimed property website went through a major system upgrade in June, making it easier for people trying to find their unclaimed property. To see if you have property waiting to be claimed.

Treasurer Garrity is herself a retired Colonel of the US Army Reserves. She served three deployments in defense of the United States: In 1991, in Operation Desert Storm, in 2004 in Operation Iraqi Freedom and in 2008 in Operation Enduring Freedom. She was awarded the Bronze Star twice for exceptional service and received the Legion of Merit.

ARMY vs. NAVY TRIVIA

Did you know....

The first Army Navy game was held November 29. 1890 at "The Plain" in West Point. Navy had been playing organized football since 1879 and defeated the newly established Army team 24-0.

All 271 members of the 1890 Corps of Cadets had to pay \$0.52 to pay half of Navy's traveling expenses for their first game.

In 1893, Navy midshipman Joseph "Bull" Reeves, on advice from a Navy physician who warned him another kick in the head could result in an intellectual disability or death, commissioned a Annapolis shoemaker to make what is considered the first football helmet out of leather. Reeves went on to have distinguished career and retired as a four-star Admiral. Reeves is known as the "Father of Carrier Aviation"

Since 1890, the have been 10 years when no game was played. The longest hiatus was from 1894-1898 after an argument between an Army general and a Navy admiral almost resulted in a duel following the 1893 game. In 1909, Army cancelled its remaining games after Cadet Eugene Byrne died from an injury sustained in a game against Harvard. The War Department cancelled the games in 1917 & 1918. In 1928 & 1929 the game was cancelled after a dispute over "player eligibility standards" (i.e. 'ringers')

In 1944 & 1945 Army & Navy were ranked #1 & #2 respectively. Army won both games.

Instant replay made its American debut in the 1963 Army Navy game.

Navy holds the edge in wins with a 61-54-6 record.
